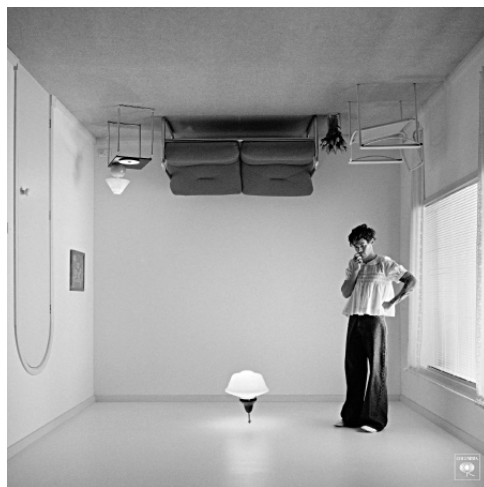
has done since March (and earlier, if we include all the false alarms we had for this album) until now.
